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TRUSTEES REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 5TH APRIL 2019

The Trustees are pleased to present their report together with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 5th April 2019.

Legal and administrative information set out on the information page forms part of this report. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in the notes to the accounts and comply with the Charity's Trust Deed, the Charities Act 2011 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland published on 16th July 2014.

Public benefit

The Trustees confirm that they have taken account of the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit. The benefits are as outlined in the Charity's objectives noted above.

Objectives and activities

The objectives of the charity are:

- i) to protect and promote the health of the public in particular by research into the nature, causes, diagnosis, prevention, treatment (including complications of treatment) and cure of head and neck cancer;
- ii) to disseminate the useful results of such research to provide information and to raise public understanding of head and neck cancer, its causes, prevention and treatment.

Activities for achieving objectives

The Charity's first goal has been to introduce Sentinel Node Biopsy (SNB) to the UK for treating mouth cancer. In early mouth cancer 30% of patients have undetectable microscopic spread cancer to their neck at diagnosis. SNB is a very accurate way of establishing when otherwise invisible microscopic clumps of cancerous cells start to leave the main cancer and migrate.

The charity has created the Head Start National Training Programme which introduces Sentinel Node Biopsy for the Management of Patients with Early Oral Cancer. This Programme is approved by the Royal College of Surgeons (RCS). When clinicians attend the 1st stage of the Programme, the training day, they receive 5 CPD points from the Royal College of Surgeons (RCS).

The training Programme complements the National Institute for Health Care and Excellence (NICE) recommendations that SNB is an alternative to elective neck dissection (END) and should be considered for patients with early (stage 1 & 2) mouth cancer. The objectives of the Programme are to introduce SNB in a uniform way across the country offering a well-structured, high quality training course, ensuring a uniform standard of SNB practice in the UK proven by low incidence of false negative results and validated through an online data base. Consequently, the training Programme is designed for hospital teams attending together. A team would usually consist of two Surgeons, a Nuclear Medic, a pathologist and a Theatre Nurse.

The charity runs the Programme four times a year and over 90 individuals have completed the training day. We currently have 53 Teams in UK engaged in the training Programme. These teams are drawn from 62 UK surgeons, 31 Nuclear medicine physicians, 23 Pathologists and 19 Theatre Practitioners. We have also trained over 30 European clinicians.

SNB and tests are now available in University College London, Aintree Hospital Liverpool, Queen Elizabeth Hospital Glasgow, Oxford University Hospital, University Hospital Coventry, City Hospital Sunderland, East Kent Hospital and Queen Victoria Hospital East Grinstead. Additionally we have over forty units who have completed the training Programme.

Our second objective is to raise awareness of head and neck cancers and this we have done using a range of media. This has included regular newspaper articles, national social media and radio to showcase our work and our vision, producing news releases to support campaign awareness, events, fundraising and overall awareness and news generation via social media including YouTube, Facebook and Twitter.

We have created a new website which is the driving force behind our growth, both in terms of awareness and fundraising. We now attract more targeted traffic from a variety of relevant keywords which gives us more awareness amongst a variety of users, more people watching our videos and hopefully supporting early diagnosis.

We have also launched a Facebook Community Group which is an online forum for patients, newly diagnosed and family and friends to meet together online, ask questions, seek support and advice. We inject news and questions for conversation starters and link people to our website or other trusted sources for information where relevant.

Financial Review

Reserves policy

The Charity's policy is to keep expenditure including the management and administration costs broadly in line with the income received in the year. At 5th April 2019 the Charity had net funds of £463,448 (2018: £373,148).

Structure, governance and management

The charity was established by constitution as a charitable incorporated organisation and registered at the Charity Commission on 23rd February 2015.

The Trustees of the charity are listed on the information page. New Trustees may be appointed by the existing Trustees. The Trustees meet once a quarter to review the charity's activities and the risks to which it is exposed and confirm that controls are in place to mitigate those risks.

Plans for future periods

The Charity's goal is to introduce SNB to all cancer centres in the UK. We will achieve this by collaborating with national bodies to run a UK prospective randomned trial. The introduction of SNB will revolutionise the management of mouth cancer in the UK and will set the pace for Europe and America.



NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 5TH APRIL 2019

1 Accounting Policies

1.1 Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity, have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) issued on 16th July 2014 and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) and the Charities Act 2011 and UK Generally Accepted Accounting Practice as it applies from 1st January 2015. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of investments.

The financial statements have been prepared to give a 'true and fair' view and have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a 'true and fair' view. This departure has involved following Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) issued on 16th July 2014 rather than the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended practice effective from 1st April 2005 which has since been withdrawn.

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the Charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

1.2 Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

1.3 Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to that category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

1.4 Fund accounting

All funds held by the charity are unrestricted general funds which can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the Trustees.
